

WAPPENSTEIN SEES THINGS

Police Chief Wappenstein of Seattle, sees the Handwriting on the Wall. He knows he cannot escape his own record. "The Socialist," by its terrible revelations of Wappenstein in Cincinnati has started the city. Everywhere in Seattle, people are buying copies of "The Socialist" of April 13 and reading its account of what Wappy was in his young days.

The Chief is now making every effort to suppress "The Socialist." He is exercising the most arbitrary power.

For years small news carts have been a feature of Seattle streets, calling "Your Home Paper, Here!" Seattle is inhabited by people from every city in America. These news carts have been a great convenience and have become a dozen newsboys. Jimmie Heffernan, "the Irish World Man," as he is called, is the most popular.

To such petty persecution is the Police Department of a great city subjected!

Why? Because they dared to sell "The Socialist" and to display one of our cards advertising "The Terrible Truth About Wappenstein."

And worse. "The Socialist" is sold on the streets of Seattle by the newsboys, hundreds of copies each week. These boys call out the leading features of the paper, as they do with other papers. They were not molested last week. One of the boys did a land office business below Yester Way last Saturday night, calling, "The Socialist, here, full account Steunenberg's Frauds; indictment Senator Borah!" A "Cop" stopped him, telling him he could sell his papers, but must not call. That is, if a customer happened.

PORTLAND PLATFORM

We, the Socialists of the City of Portland, in convention assembled, do hereby reassert our adherence to the principles and program of International Revolutionary Socialism.

In view of the fact that the Working Class, by their intelligence, industry and skill, create every object of wealth in the world, yet are, through the private ownership of the tools and means of production and distribution, denied access to the very wealth which their own hands alone have created; and as we believe that the vesting of this power to withhold from the masses, by a powerful few, the surplus value which has been created by these masses, leaving them but a bare subsistence, is a privilege granted by a political force, the creature of these dominant few, the capitalist class; and as we further believe that this Class-Government, this private creature of the dominant few, of a necessity must become the public servant of the democratic whole:

Therefore we assert that the Socialists of the City of Portland enter the political field as a fraction of the International Socialist Movement which aspires to wrest from the capitalist class the powers of government and to use these powers in the interest of the Working Class.

Our aim in doing this is the abolition of all laws which vest in the individual the right to own privately what is needed for use by all.

In other words, the abolition of the wage system.

With this aim in view we place in the field a ticket which is composed of dues-paying members of the Socialist Party, all of whom must have been members of the party at least one year. We demand of them that they pledge themselves, if elected, to act in accordance with instructions from their party organization and not as individuals.

And so without any attempt to avoid having any person we lay before the voters this declaration of our principles and aims.

If you believe in the taking over of the tools and means of production and distribution by society and the rendering to the worker of the full value of his labor, vote the Socialist Ticket as a whole and not for the Socialist as an individual.

If you believe in the private ownership of these social necessities, vote against the Socialist Ticket.

We stand before the voters, not as non-partisans, but confessing to a belief in the strongest kind of partisanship. Our only viewpoint is a class viewpoint. We stand for the interest of the Working Class. For the Capitalist Class we have no concern.

to notice he had papers to sell and asked him for one, the newsboy could let him have one.

Such is Police Power in Seattle! Such is a Free Press in Seattle! If you dare to print the truth about the Chief of Police, his officers will forbid your paper's sale on the streets, notwithstanding such sale is expressly provided for by City Ordinance.

"The Socialist" may have to establish an "Underground Railway" yet for its distribution in this city.

WHO CHIEF WAPPENSTEIN IS

The office holding agents of capitalism today are necessary to bulldoze, intimidate and brow-beat the wage slave, just as the office holders under chattel slave owners, were necessary to dog, shoot and kill the chattel slave.

The object of this article is to add some fellow workmen to pluck the scales from his eyes and see his class interest and behold the true record of the man whom William Hickman Moore, Seattle's Municipal-Ownership-saloon-Sunday-closing - rip-roaring-rock-bottom-Hickory-Jackson-Mayor of Seattle, claims, is the right holder of his administration.

THE CZAR OF SEATTLE

Today Wappenstein is Seattle's omnipotent Chief of Police, appointed presumably by the Mayor, but we think in reality by a capitalist behind the scenes. We will treat on this subject more fully in our next week's contribution which will be on "WILLIAM HICKMAN MOORE, Seattle's Reform Mayor."

Wappenstein has had a busy life, and like the hawk spoken of by Mr.

Finigan to Mr. Finigan, "he is in again, out again, in again, Finigan."

Wappenstein's appointment was a shock to many of Seattle's citizens and while a majority have recovered, many are yet wondering how it happened.

He got busy as soon as he was appointed without being told to hurry.

He ordered all prize fighters to leave town but overlooked a bunch of Surething, Double Cross Grafters, who had been running fake fights and wrestling matches in a house boat on Lake Washington for months, and who continued for months after Wap's appointment, and robbed people to the extent of two hundred thousand dollars, under Seattle's reform Mayor.

When the Seattle "Star" published the story about this gang of cut throats, Wappy said that he did not know that they were here.

We know better. Wappenstein knew this gang was working in September, 1905, and Mayor Moore does not dare to ask for the evidence of this fact to be furnished to our city council.

SIXTY THOUSAND FROM PROSTITUTION

"People who violate the law by renting houses for purposes of prostitution will be prosecuted," was the quotation in our Public Press.

Then the fact came to us through the "Post-Intelligencer" that Wappenstein had made an arrangement whereby crime and prostitution would pay the City of Seattle sixty thousand dollars per year.

The city a partner in crime! What a glorious victory over crime by our moral giant, and known, supported and sanctioned by these Christian gentlemen, of family!

Yes, the owners of the houses are to pay one-fifth of their rent into the city treasury and this together with the fines from prostitutes (which in Seattle is a crime licensed by our city administration) will net the city sixty thousand dollars per year.

But, said Wappenstein, in no case will the landlords be allowed to refuse the rent because this would make the prostitutes steal. A valuable man to capitalists, is Wappy, because only a post graduate expert specialist could possess the qualification to inform us how much rent a wretched, shivering harlot could pay before she would steal.

This is what you voted for, Christians and followers of our Brother Jesus, is it not?

SPIRITUALISTS DRIVEN OUT

A few poor, intellectual pigmies runts, were set on the spiritualists, and all fortune tellers, clairvoyants and palmists are "vags" and must leave town, said Wap.

A Socialist is not safe to be on the street after sundown without a ball bond in his pocket duly approved by the court.



THE MORAL SQUAD

(Rejected by the "Oregonian.") In the land of the free and the home of the brave, I see in "The Oregonian," that our so-called "Moral Squad" (?) are to be given still more latitude for the violation of one of the greatest principles of free government; the maintenance of the home inviolate.

We are told on every hand by statesmen innumerable that there are no classes in the United States, and that the rich and poor are equal before the law.

Dare any sane person maintain for a single instant, that this moral or immoral squad would be allowed to proceed into the wealthy district of this city and indiscriminately bundle the occupants of a house into a patrol and like a load of cattle dump them at the station, there to prove their respectability to the officer in charge, or if he felt so inclined, to lie in a lousy jail until they provided for the presence of any excuse to the police judge?

Yet there is, perhaps, as much immorality concealed on the hills of Portland as in the valley.

The lodging houses of this city contain thousands and thousands of honest workers, they are their homes, the only ones they know and in many cases the only ones they ever will know. In Russia the Cossacks are forced to serve papers on people whom they suspect of having dangerous explosives in their possession. Here in Portland you send worse than Cossacks out, free to break into any place like a burglar in the night.

Suppose they went to the home of the Hon. Mayor of this city at say 12:00 or 1:00 o'clock in the morning, rang the bell, and when the mayor appeared, said, "I want you," clapped their hand on his shoulder and took him to a patrol box. When he wanted to know what he was arrested for he would be told the captain would tell him. When he got to the station he could explain where he was married, when, etc., or send a messenger boy to his home for his marriage certificate, showing that he was entitled to be alive. Then he would be forced to prove that the lady under arrest with him was the one that the certificate called for.

Suppose this famous squad of moral hunters take a turn in the Portland Hotel and "plish" every couple they find there without proper credentials. But they won't, although there is probably as much excuse for one as the other. If they are justified in the poorer lodging house they are justified just as well at the Portland Hotel if we are all equal before the law.

Any officer going to any place to make an arrest should have at least

Local Seattle

The Third Ward Branch meets Monday, April 29, at 526 20th Avenue N. Secretary is J. C. Carlson, 619 31st Avenue N.

At the City Executive Committee meeting Sunday Comrade Ray S. L. Barre presided. Routine business was transacted, after which a report from Comrade Emil Herman on the action of the Sixth Ward Branch in refusing to accept his transfer of membership to that ward in violation of the local constitution was discussed. The Sixth Ward Branch was censured for its action and requested to accept the application of Comrades Herman and Steele which it had held up without any stated cause. A motion that in the event of a revocation of charter the property of a branch shall revert to the local and the property of the local to the state, to be returned to the body from which it was taken on reorganization was carried. A committee consisting of Wagenknecht, Stapp and Balluff was elected to report to the credentials committee of the state convention the number of delegates to which Seattle is entitled, based on the number of members having paid dues for the month of February, March and April. The committee also reaffirmed Articles 1, 2 and 3 of Article IV of the State Constitution.

STATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Tacoma, April 21, 1907. Meeting of the State Committee called to order 1:30 p. m. by State Chairman Downie. Comrades Mudgett and Johnson present. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved. Charter applications were received from Comrades at Elma, Elberton, Tenino and Leber and granted. Report for March from National Committee Wagenknecht was accepted. A communication from the National Executive Committee was received, giving notice of the assignment of Comrade Isaac Balluff as the national organizer to this district, subject to approval by the majority of the Committee in the district and stating the following conditions: The National office will bear the entire wage of the national committee to be arranged and direct his work, and bear the additional expense of his travel. The price for the national committee or the locals will receive the same amount according to the number they may make, or it can be applied to meeting their portion of the expense of the organizer. The National office declared itself in favor of this assignment under the conditions stated.
