Dear Sirs and Brothers:—Herein enclosed you will pleas: find notice of Special Assessments Nos. 8, 9 and Dear Sirs and Brothers:—Herein enclosed you will pleas; find notice of Special Assessments Nos. 8, 9 and 10, levied this day. These assessments are necessitated by the continuance of the strike on the C., B. & Q., and as the demands are of a most urgent character, it is hoped that each Lodge will respond promptly and fully. We regret to observe that some of our Lodges are utterly indifferent to the great crisis through which we are now passing, and are contributing nothing whatever, to the financial relief of those of our brethren who are in the advance line of the battle. At this writing, eighteen of our Lodges have not yet forwarded a single dollar on the regular assessments that have been levied for the protective fund. A number of other Lodges have made but meagre returns, paying but for half, or even less, of their membership, be it said to their shame. A Lodge composed of men who are financially able to pay their assessments, and refuse to do so in such trying times as these, is a disgrace to our Brotherhood, and the quicker it disbands, the better it will be for the cause. As a rule, however, our Lodges are doing nobly, many of them have dignified and glorified themselves by their promptness and liberality, and their names will be placed upon the scroll of fame as worthy of the noble cause in which their members served with such fidelity and devotion. members served with such fidelity and devotion.

We are aware that these assessments will fall heavily upon some of our membership, but we hope that those who are financially able will come to the rescue to the end that we may meet every obligation and preserve the honored name of our Brotherhood. If All our members will do their part, and contribute in proportion to their means, we shall be able to meet every demand, while the burden will fall lightly upon those whose circumstances are such that they cannot pay the increased assessments. Some of our Lodges have appointed soliciting committees who have called on the business men of their respective communities and have met with marked success. A number of merchants, who are interested in our cause, have contributed liberally, and no doubt there are many others who would do likewise if called upon. The more money we can raise in this way the less assessments we will be required to levy. Try it! Every dollar counts! By all means let the money come as speedily as it can be collected. Our prospects are brightening. The situation is very encouraging. There is every indication of success in the near future. Our men are loyal all along the line, and with your support, they will remain so until victory is perched upon the banner of the Brotherhood.

### SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS.

In collecting assessments 8, 9 and 10, Collectors will not receive less than the full amount, \$3.00 from each member. A partial payment cannot be accepted. In making out their monthy statements, Collectors will place a figure three (3) opposite the name of each member who made payment. If any back assessments (special) have been collected, they will be added to the current and credited in the "special assessment" column.

Members will bear in mind that if they fail, or decline to make payment of a special assessment, they stand suspended for sixty days, and at the expiration of sixty days, they stand expelled from the Order. This is the law and it must apply equally to all. There can be no exceptions. The Grand Lodge has no more authority to change the law than an individual member.

Let the expulsions be few and far between. Let there be a prompt rest onse to the assessments all along the line. They may seem heavy, but when the interests at stake are considered, they are trifling in comparison. The money you are now paying out, will be as bread cast upon the waters. Every dollar will come back to you tenfold.

TERRE HAUTE, IND., February 27th, 1888.

To all Subordinate Lodges:

Dear Sirs and Brothers—Pursuant to the requirements of Section 10 (page 46 of Ritual) you are hereby officially notified that a strike has been inaugurated this day on the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy system of railroads, under the direction and with the consent and approval of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, and by authority vested in me as Grand Master, the said strike is hereby declared as having the sanction of the laws of the Brotherhood.

The Joint Board of Adjustment of said C., B. & Q. system of railways was duly organized and proceeded in the matter of adjusting the grievances submitted to them, in all things as the law directs. The said Board acted co jointly with the General Grievance Committee of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers of said system, and every method known to arbitration has been exhausted in the attempt to effect an amicable adjustment. Having failed to accomplish the desired results in that way, a strike was ordered as the only alternative, and this has received the sanction of the executive officers of both Brotherhoods. This strike took effect at four (4) o'clock this Monday morning, February 27th, and all members throughout the jurisdiction of the Brotherhood are notified that under no circumstances should they accept a position on the said C., B. & Q. system of railways during the continuance of the strike, and while our members are struggling for their rights. The strike extends over all the lines owned, leased and operated by the C., B. & Q. system of railways, generally known as the Burlington Route. The strike was only inaugurated after due and careful consideration had been given to all questions involved, the principal grievance consisting of the injustices growing out of the classification of wages and its attending evils. The conflict is against oppression and in the interest of right and justice, and the sympathy of every member of our Order should be enlisted on the side of the participants.

As we have only a limited amount of means in our Protective Fund, a

As we have only a limited amount of means in our Protective Fund, a special assessment may be required to meet the exigencies of the occasion. This will not be levied unless positively necessary, and in that event it is hoped that each Lodge will respond promptly in giving relief to our brethren in this, their battle for right and justice.

DEAR SIRS AND BROTHERS: -Since the inauguration of the strike on the C., B. & Q. system, our Subordinate Lodges have been deluged with correspondence relating to the strike. The motive of many of the writers it is not our purpose to question, but as others have been maliciously inclined, we find it necessary to make this statement in behalf of the Grand Lodge. Before proceeding we desire to introduce the following letter which has been circulated among our Subordinate Lodges: St. Joseph, Mo., June 1, 1888.

St. Joseph, Mo., June 1, 1888.

Dear Sirs and Brothers:—It has been rumored that the strike on the "Q." system for right and justice had been declared off. We are writing to all Lodges and informing them that such is not the case. Well, brothers, you are no doubt aware that this tight is as much yours as ours, and it remains for you to say whether we are defeated or not. The "Q." system is only waiting for our next pay day and thinks there is going to be a break in our ranks. Now, brothers, we can win this fight if you will lend us your financial aid. Our Committeeman is home from Chicago and gave us an excellent report, with one exception, and that is Bro. F. P. Sargent says he will not levy any more assessments to help this cause along. Now what have you got to say in regard to that? Well, brothers, we have taken it out of his hands the same as the engineers did P. M. Arthur's, and placed it in the hands of our Grievance Committee, so all donations you can please send to Hoge, engineer, and Murphy fireman. There is a brother to be among you soon to give you the true state of affairs.

The statement that the management of the strike has been taken out of the hands of the Grand Master is absolutely false and without foundation and is well calculated to create a false impression with the members of our Order. The Grand Master has not been impeached; he occupies his position as heretofore and continues to discharge the executive duties of his office, all reports to the contrary notwithstanding. In the foregoing letter, Lodges are advised to forward all contributions in aid of the strikers to the Chairman at Chicago. Other letters of a similar character have been written advising that moneys be sent to other points on the C., B. & Q. system. We concede to each Lodge the right to make contributions in answer to these letters as they may see fit, but it must be distinctly understood that the Grand Lodge is in no way responsible for moneys contributed in support of the strike unless forwarded to the Grand Secretary and Treasurer. A detailed report of all moneys received and disbursed by the Grand Lodge for the C., B. & Q. strike will be submitted at the proper time, but no account need be expected from the Grand Lodge of moneys contributed promiscuously in response to such letters as have been put in circulation during the past few weeks. Still other letters have been written, severely criticising the management of the strike. The most vulgar abuse has been heaped upon the men in charge, reports grossly exaggerated and totally false have been circulated and all for the purpose of gratifying a personal animosity and a selfish end. At the proper time due action will be taken in this matter. Meantime we advise our Lodges, upon receipt of such letters as we have alluded to, letters teeming with slander and falsehood, letters wholly unauthorized, to destroy them and not permit them to be read at meetings. No true member of our Order will give ear to such scurrilous communications.
