Laurel Will Soon Have to Answer To The People.

LIBERALS NOW TAKING ACTION

Canada No Longer Enjoys Representative Government—No Promise Made Whatever To Carry Out Their Platform—Conservatives Will Also Have To Change.

The Salmon Arm Liberal association have taken the initiative in the calling of a convention of delegates of this constituency to nominate a candidate for the forthcoming Dominion elections, in the interests of the Liberal party. Revelstoke is suggested as the meeting place and Sept. 15th the date. All the Liberal associations in the riding have been asked to call a meeting and advise the Salmon Arm association as soon as possible.

Apparently the Salmon Arm Liberals do not intend to wait for a general redistribution measure, after the census, and Hewitt Bostock possibly wishes to find out where he is at. The Eagle can safely say that he doesn't figure so high in the polls. This should bring the other political parties and set the ball a rolling. If the Independent Labor party purpose placing a candidate in the field, now is their time to say so.

It matters not whether the elections are held now or in the new year, Sir Wilfrid Laurier must be shown in an uncertain tone that when the people of Western Canada elect him on certain conditions and promises they must be carried out. Sir Wilfrid advocated certain principles, and on the strength of these was elected, but since he has made no promise whatever to carry out those principles he should be turned down. Representative government is no longer representative when Laurier is elected to do one thing and he does precisely the opposite.

"Put us in power" said Sir Wilfrid Laurier, "and I will legislate to have C. P. R. lands under taxation." To make a promise is one thing, to keep it is another. If he had done the thing, to remain there is another. Sir Wilfrid's unkept pledges were the means of his election as they will be of his defeat. Our country is tied hand and foot by this monopoly and our eloquent, plausible, little promisee is doing all in his power to make the tie tighter.

If the Conservatives would go to the country, so far as to control the C. P. R., so far as Western Canada is concerned, they would win hands down. And unless the Conservatives produce a more progressive platform than the Liberals, and others do not meet the requirements of this modern age, the only course open is to secure Independent Labor candidates and elect them. The people are growing tired of being flimflamed by both the old-time parties.

John Houston of the Nelson Tribune, who seems to have received a private tip, in speaking of the above convention says: "The nominee of that convention will be a Nelson man, and he will carry the constituency hands down." The chances are the Tribune means that John Houston is the dark horse.

LARDEAU'S PAYROLL CENTRE.

Ferguson is the supply point for the Old Gold camp, all properties up the north and south forks of the Lardreau the Nettie L. Hill, Great Northern Hill. CONCENTRATOR FOR THE CUP.

Freighters Asked By Manager Dildetham To Bid on Carriage.

The EAGLE is informed on good authority that Manager Dildetham of the Silver Cup has asked Messrs. Craig & Hillman and others to bid on the cost of the carriage of a concentrator plant from Thomson's Landing to Ferguson. This seems to indicate that the local saw mill has decided to push their interests in this camp to the front. If the concentrator is located at what is known as the No. 3 grade, or in sight on the Broadview, just back of Ferguson. The local saw mill is located conveniently and there will be no trouble in procuring lumber. If the work is pushed to completion the whole ledge (locally known as the Great Horn ledge) is here, and it will be in fact any particulars; but it will all come out of these fine days.

A BIG LUMBER COMBINE.

Their Immense Saw Mill Plant May be Concentrated at Revelstoke.

A lumber combine has just been formed in North Kootenay, which includes the Columbia River Lumber Co., Genelle & Co., and the Fred. Robinson Lumber Co., all big concerns. It is just possible that the new monopoly will concentrate their works at Revelstoke, as all their best and largest timber limits are located on the Columbia river above that point. If this is done the company will require a railroad into the Big Bend at once, as it would take at least three train loads a day to keep the immense institution going. If true, this will mean the salvation of Revelstoke, as transportation will then be provided for other purposes. As the Revelstoke's payroll will be increased by many thousands of dollars a month.

SCHOOL OPENING ON AUGUST 13.

The desks for Ferguson's public school have been ordered by the trustees from one of the best manufacturers in the east. They will be here in time to be ready for the school opening on August 13th. The other necessities are being provided locally. A teacher has been engaged as teacher. No effort will be spared to make the school worthy of heads of families residing in the district bringing in their families. This will mean the erection of two or more residences in town.

Development Going On In Every Direction.

SHIPMENTS NOW BEING MADE

Deal Pending on the Surprise.—The Trium's First Shipment.—Black Diamond, Silver Belt, Hunter and Trapper, Whistler, Copper Mask, Index, Cup, Wagner, Spokane.

THE SURPRISE GROUP.

Jas. McMahon, who with D. Morgan, W. Foote and A. Macintosh, owns the Surprise group at the head of Surprise creek, up the north fork of the Lardreau, has been in town on Saturday evening and returned on Monday morning with supplies. Mr. McMahon and Mr. Morgan have completed the trail up the creek to their property, and are now busy sinking a shaft on the lead, as well as making ready to build a shaft house and cabin, so that work can be continued all winter. The owners have a deal pending for a fair figure, but if it fails to go through all winter, a shipment of 375 ore will be made at any time, but with depth the value of the ore is increasing so that it will be more profitable to wait until about mid-winter. The group consists of three claims, the Surprise, Welsh and a fraction. Mr. McMahon is very much interested in the development of the Surprise for he feels certain that it is a winning proposition, one that even a poor man can handle. And if the company now negotiating for the property fails to come up and his partners will prove this contention to be true. If the deal does materialize in other properties they hold in that locality.

Assays from the Black Diamond give small values in gold and as high as \$200 in silver to the ton. J. F. Burman, M. E. P. L. S., of Vernon, will survey the property this week.

SILVER BELT GROUP.

The full assessment work has now been ordered upon the Silver Belt group on Brown creek up the south fork, owned by the Silver Belt syndicate, of which Geo. K. Morton, St. Thomas, Ont., is a trustee. Surveying and crown granting will be proceeded with immediately. Arrangements are being made for systematic development on a large scale, under the direction of a qualified engineer.

REORGANIZATION OF THE C. M. M. & D. CO.

The Hunter and Trapper claims on Pool creek, owned by the Canada Mutual M. & D. Co., Ltd., Toronto, are being re-organized. The work completed by contract with the intention of surveying and crown granting as early as possible. The company intend developing a strong subsidiary corporation to proceed with the work, giving their own shareholders the first issue of shares at a ground floor price.

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\$36,100 IS GRANTED

Thos. Taylor Successful In Securing More Money.

DECIDED CHANGE FOR LARDEAU

The Advantage of Having A Live Member is Already Evident.—We Have A Rich District, But It Must Be Opened Up Before Government Revenue Will Accrue.

Road repairing work on the road between here and the Landing, and up the north and south forks of the Lardreau, has ceased for the time being at any rate. Thos. Taylor, M. P., left for Victoria a couple of weeks ago to try and get \$10,000 advanced to continue the good work, and also open up a couple of much needed new trails. But he apparently will have to wait until the house meets before he can accomplish anything. Demands on the public treasury are going to the point of being met from all parts of the province, but the Lardreau seems to be especially entitled to aid, now that we are likely, by the appearance of the north and south forks, to have a year for the railway. The Lardreau of ore to be shipped from this district, but unless the wagon roads are made passable and the trunk trails repaired, the Lardreau is a dead weight. The property owners of this section have enough to bear up under without the burden being increased for the lack of even trunk trails and a decent wagon road.

Since the above was in type the EAGLE is pleased to learn from Mr. Taylor, who made a hurried trip home previous to leaving yesterday morning for Victoria, that he has been successful in obtaining a modest sum of money for the most urgent needs of the district.

A special appropriation of \$3,000 has been made for the wagon road between Ten-Mile, six miles above Portersburg, the south fork, and Thomson's Landing. This amount will hardly be sufficient, as between here and Ten-Mile, six miles above Portersburg, there is such an undertaking, so that many had places in the road are still untouched.

For the trails above Ten-Mile \$500 has been secured. This has been allocated to the north fork to have a clear cut timber from here to the summit. Besides this Mr. Taylor secured \$700 for fish creek camp trail, etc., and \$800 to put the Big Bend trail into shape, the recent high water in the Columbia river having somewhat demolished it. The settlers south of Revelstoke will have also been remembered, \$700 having been granted to fix up their trunk wagon road to town.

It does seem a change for this riding to possess a live representative at Victoria. Notwithstanding that Joe Martin dug up about \$8,000 just before the elections, Mr. Taylor, after a hard fight, has got \$6,100 more. And all this, we understand, is a special appropriation.

There will of course be the usual grant of \$15,000 for next year in the July estimates, but if Mr. Taylor has been successful in this one, the voters will be doubled, for it must be remembered that this riding is plenty big enough for two electoral districts. If our new member fills his other promises as quickly as this one, the electors will indeed have reason for thanking themselves that they elected him. And the EAGLE believes Mr. Taylor will. Mr. Taylor will confer with R. F. Green, the Sitkan member, next week as to the trunk trail from here to the Duncanson slope.

The matter of raising the wages on public works to the local scale will also be brought before the government for immediate consideration.
