## ANOTHER BIG LARDEAU DEAL

**A Big Camborne Free Gold Property Changes Ownership.**

## THE EVA MINE IS SOLD

**The New Company to be Incorporated as the Calumet and B. C. Gold Mines, Ltd.**

The Eva mine, the biggest free-gold property in this camp, in which experts estimate there is enough pay ore blocked out to keep a ten stamp mill running for four years, was sold to a company of underwriters on the 22nd inst. A company to be known as the Calumet & British Columbia Gold Mines, Ltd., to be incorporated under the laws of this province is taking over the property on which active work will be started at once. The deal was put through by A. F. Rosenberger, of the Mines Exchange, Nelson, B. C., Salmon, Idaho and Chicago, Ill. Mr. Rosenberger is now in Chicago and telegrams received from him state that stock in the new company is being rapidly taken up, over 100,000 shares has been subscribed for in Rush City, Minnesota, alone. The capitalization of the new company is to be \$500,000 in \$1.00 shares and the stock will be non-assessible, non-liability. The Eva was owned by the Imperial Development Syndicate of Nelson and has been systematically developed under the able management of A. H. Gracey, M. E. of Nelson. Over 2000 feet of tunneling has been driven besides different shafts and winzes. The Eva-group consists of the Eva, Last Chance, Iron Dollar and Highland Mary, together with other fractional claims situated on Lexington Mountain, right at the back door of and overlooking Camborne. The new company has purchased ten acres of ground on Pool creek from the Camborne Townsite Co., and will erect thereon stamp mills and power plant as soon as possible, and a tramway will be constructed from Pool Creek to the mine. The Eva has been closed down for some time past pending a deal and the immediate resumption of work will make things hum in Camborne. Everyone in this district is conversant with the Eva and the universal opinion is that no cleaner mining proposition could be found anywhere, as the mine has been brought to a stage where its estimated value in sight are well over a quarter million dollars and the continuity of gold bearing veins, so far developed, gives certainty, so far as geological knowledge goes, that millions of dollars lie waiting further development.

## TO PARALLEL THE C. P. R.

**Gen. Manager Hayes Has Plans Completed Whereby**

## THE GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY

**Will Build to St. Paul and on Through Manitoba and the Northwest.**

The Chicago and Grand Trunk have very extensive plans for making that line a transcontinental system. Mr. Chas. M. Hayes, general manager of the grand trunk, has been here preparing a program for the extension west from Chicago. Since Mr. Hayes left the service of the Southern Pacific and resumed his old place with the Grand Trunk system he has been very busy with these plans. Mr. Hayes returned to Chicago a few weeks ago from London, where his proposals were submitted to the Grand Trunk board, and it is said they have received the approval of the directors. The idea is to extend the Grand Trunk through Wisconsin and Minnesota to St. Paul thence northwest into Manitoba and from there to build a line practically paralleling the C. P. R. The report comes from one of Mr. Hayes' close associates, who says there is no question that active work in construction will begin within 12 months.

## Roseland Ore Shipments.

For the first time in recent months a week has been passed in Roseland without some slight interruption to shipping operations at one or other of the big mines, says the Roseland Miner, and the result is that a normal figure has been attained in the output. The tonnage for the week ending tonight is over 8,000, and unless the unforeseen occurs the regular weekly average for the balance of the year will range between eight and nine thousand tons. On this basis the camp will not be producing largely as compared with the tonnage expected when lower freight and treatment charges stimulate production at the Le Roi, and concentration is applied to War Eagle and Centre Star ores. The magnitude attained by the output is a guarantee of a large payroll and a prosperous winter in the camp.

The week's total is made up as follows: Le Roi, 4,125 tons; Le Roi No. 2, 1,344; Centre star, 1,680; War Eagle, 1,170; Giant, 180; Velvet, 60. Total for week, 8,569 tons. The amended total for the year to date is 241,543 tons.

## The Rob Roy.

The above property, situated on the north fork of the Lardeau, is to be worked with a considerable force during the coming winter. A pack train loaded with supplies from G. B. Batho and Co. left Ferguson Tuesday for the claim and another will be sent as soon as the pack train is available. The property is owned by Rev. Mr. Courtney, who was in Ferguson during the summer, and other Ontario capitalists. The Eagle cannot speak as to the showing on the claim, but can say that it is at least in a good mineral belt.

## Botha Receives \$10,000.

General Botha, the former Boer commander, in a speech at Rotterdam recently said he had received \$10,000 in aid of the destitute Boers from Arthur White, an American, and appealed to others to follow his example, as the general's purpose of obtaining further compensation for property destroyed had failed. They had no intention of changing the peace conditions, but they appealed for assistance for the 16,000 wounded, the majority of whom are incapable of working; and for those who had lost everything.

A party of Boer farmers sailed for Canada on the 22nd via England for the purpose of seeing how farming is carried on in Canada, they will also sail from Vancouver to Australia and then on to the Cape.

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## Redistribution.

There appears to be a hitch in the meeting of the provincial premiers, which was announced by Mr. Peters, leader of the Prince Edward Island government, to take place in the city of Quebec this month. September is nearly over and there has been no word or sign of the meeting.

It is understood that the premiers of the English speaking provinces, or at least Ross, of Ontario; Peters, of Prince Edward Island; Tweedie, of New Brunswick, and Murphy, of Nova Scotia had agreed upon an appeal to the Imperial government to bring about a modification of the British North American Act, so as to prevent the three provinces losing members, which appears to be the result of the last course. These gentlemen, however, found a stumbling block. It is said, in Premier Farnon, of Quebec, hence the calling off prematurely, or temporarily of a conference of provincial premiers, and it is now said that lower provinces' liberal members, in fact, the whole department from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island, are pledged to vote against any redistribution bill taking away members from the maritime provinces.—News.

## Received by the Pope.

Archbishop Guidi, the apostolic delegate to the Philippine Islands and his secretary, Father O'Connor, of the English church of San Josever had an audience with the pope Monday morning.

The pope also accorded a private audience to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the premier of Canada, and Lady Laurier, and was very cordial to them.

## Boer Manifesto Resented.

The tone and contents of the manifesto of the Boer generals, which was issued in the form of an appeal to the civilized world, for contributions to assist the destitute Boers and help in

the education of the Boer children, excite to the utmost resentment of the whole British press, and the document tends to alienate the sympathy which has hitherto been for the Boer people in many quarters. It is regarded as a manifesto of hostility to Great Britain and the work, not of Generals Botha, De Wet and Delaroy, but of Dr. Leyds, the European representative of the Boers, and Mr. Beit, former state secretary of the Transvaal, and a blunder which the Boers will live to regret. The sentiment contained in the manifesto that 3000 houses were burned is declared to be gross exaggeration, and complaint is made that while the document presents the cause against Great Britain in the worst possible light, it dishonorably ignores the fact that the British government has promised to advance loans free of interest for two years to enable the Boers to settle on their farms. It is pointed out that if Boers' estimate, \$30,000,000 of farms destroyed is incorrect, the \$5,000,000 grants under the peace terms will give each family \$500. The idea that the appeal is likely to result in getting something like \$150,000,000 is ridiculous.

## Mobocan Group.

The above group lies near Eight-Mile and is owned by a syndicate of Roseland gentlemen including J. W. Westfall, who is superintendent, Fred C. Elliott, solicitor, and J. C. Murray, resident director. Considerable surface work has been done this summer, mostly in prospecting the property. There is a good ledge carrying values in copper and silver and can be traced for 600 feet showing good clean ore all the way. Although very little depth has been attained, some recent assays of the ore gave the following fine results, \$17.00, \$116.00, \$41.00, \$114.80 and \$122.00.

Word was brought down Monday that the lead is better than over and the management have determined to keep a small force of men on the property all winter. The property is not a stocked concern and no shares are consequently to be sold. The owners believe they have a good property and are going to open it up.

## Trout Lake Oddfellows.

The oddfellows of Trout Lake had a most successful dance on Tuesday night to celebrate the completion and opening of their new hall. Buses were run between Ferguson and Trout Lake and a large number attended from this town. The dance was a good one and had the roads not been so very muddy there would have been a much larger crowd from outside points. As it was there were 25 couples present including a number from Comaplex.

## First Snowfall of the Season.

Thursday afternoon Phenicians were treated to the first snow fall of the season. For two or three hours it stormed furiously, covering everything with an inch of the beautiful, which, however, quickly disappeared the next day in the warm sunshine. The autumnal equinox was certainly a success. Last year the first fall of snow here occurred September 6th.—Pioneer.

## PROVINCE HAS A BRIGHT FUTURE

**So Says Bernard Macdonald, Manager of Le Roi No. 2.**

## HE IS LEAVING ROSSLAND

**But Will Continue the Management of Le Roi No. 2 and Roseland-Kootenay Mines.**

The report has been circulated about the city for some time past that Bernard Macdonald, general manager and consulting engineer of the Le Roi No. 2, and Roseland-Kootenay mines, was about to move to Spokane and make that city his headquarters. It is an interview with the Miner yesterday Mr. Macdonald confirmed the report and discussed the matter as follows: "Well, yes, the report is practically true. I have taken a house in Spokane and my family moves there in a couple of weeks or so. I have decided to make Spokane my home and my business headquarters in future.

"This move in no way disturbs my present connection with the mines at this place. I expect that the more central location of Spokane in the mining regions will be advantageous to my business, while the superior educational facilities it affords will be very desirable for my family.

"My opinion as to the permanency of this camp has suffered no change and is well known. The mining and beneficentation of the ore deposits that lie under the mountains surrounding Roseland will occupy the genius and attention of mining engineers for the present generation at least, and Roseland should be, in consequence, a prosperous community and continue, as it now is, one of the most desirable mining camps of the Rocky mountains in which to live.

"I think the depression in mining has already reached low water mark, in fact I look for a general renaissance of the industry within the next few years in the province. I expect the federal and provincial legislation that is now killing the industry will be repealed. I anticipate that a new and comprehensive code of mining laws, framed by the collaboration of statesmen, political economists and mining engineers will be passed by both Dominion and provincial parliaments. Such a code would be framed as to relate mining, not only of its present legislative burdens, but also insure to it adequate protection and freedom from the clumsy and burdensome annual emanations of the legislators at Victoria for a dozen years at least. The stability which such a code would bring to the industry would attract capital for investment in mining enterprises from all quarters of the world.

## The Comstock.

The Comstock group is situated near the mouth of the west fork of the Duncan river. There is a good showing since the season's assessment work has been completed. The ledge has been traced for a distance of 100 feet by means of open surface cuts and there is a foot of nearly solid galena. J. M. Brown has been up at the property having the work done and he is quite elated over the way the development has improved the showing. The property is owned by Geo. M. Taylor, Judge Miller and J. M. Brown.

## EDITORIAL NOTES.

Since the snowfall of last week the Lardeau has been enjoying a spell of exceedingly fine weather. This is quite natural, however, and customary in high altitudes. October is generally the best month of the year to accomplish good work and if the present good weather should continue through the month, there will have been a great deal of work done and the district will be in a strong position to face the winter. There is a vast amount of work under way at the present time, two tramways are being built and preparations are being made on a large number of claims to continue development all winter, and if bad weather were to set in permanently it would mean a serious inconvenience and loss to the camp. The freight teams and pack trains are kept constantly on the move to cope with the large amount of merchandise that is being shipped to Ferguson and then packed to the mines and prospects throughout the district. The town itself is not what one might call lively, but trade has a healthy complexion and lively times will follow when the miners begin to return from the hills.

The smelters at Trail, Greenwood, Boundary Falls, Grand Forks, Nelson and others throughout British Columbia are running full blast and treating more ore than ever before, and at Boundary Falls the smelter is being enlarged. The supply of coke from Fernie and Morrissey continues ample for the demands. The copper situation is improving and the price of the metal rising and altogether the mining situation in British Columbia is assuming a more healthy condition.

The Lardeau district holds the record, for 1909, for big mining deals in British Columbia. As was stated in these columns some time since, there is more attention being paid to the Lardeau mining district by those who are looking for desirable properties than to any district of B. C. or the Western states. One does not have to look far for the reason either. Our high grade ore and the permanency of

of our leads are becoming known to the investing classes. It will not be long before there will be plenty of buyers coming after developed claims and therefore it behooves those who have likely looking prospects to put them in such a state of development that an estimate may be made of their value. It pays to develop a property partially at least, and if the property turns out good the labor spent will be returned ten fold in the increased price that can be obtained. There has been a large amount of work done on the prospects in the Ferguson district the past summer and there are sure to be a considerable number of deals put through during next year.

On Friday last Ferguson was visited by a severe snowstorm that lasted all night and covering the ground to a depth of four inches. It looked decidedly wintry Saturday morning as residents came forth from their warm beds with the exclamation on their lips: Ye Gods what are we up against! Can winter have set in before September is expired. On the mountain summits the situation was worse and the men at the Triune fearing snow slides, and possibly fearing that snow might continue to fall till next April, packed their blankets and trudged down to Ferguson. However the weather turned warm Monday and the snow disappeared rapidly and the men hired over again determined to stay this time for the winter. The storm was the yearly equinox but came this year much earlier. Pioneers say that this is good and that there should be several weeks of fine weather following the storm. The weather for the week has certainly been the best that one could desire.

**Old Gold and Guinea.**  
The men working on the Old Gold and Guinea Gold quit work last week in consequence of a new order having been received by the foreman to the effect that the men must not work Sundays. The management remained firm in their decision to observe Sunday in future and the men likewise refused to return unless they could work and get pay for seven days a week, therefore men have been got from Rossland to fill the positions.

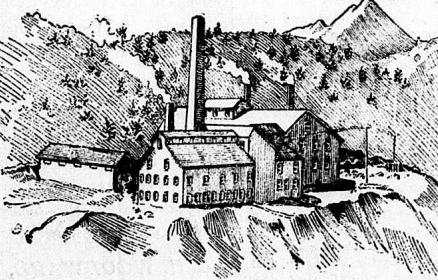
