## GOOD SYSTEM OF MINING

Is Followed by J. W. Westfall et al

## MUCH BENEFIT TO DISTRICT

Is Derived From Small Syndicates of Local Men Bonding and Developing Claims in a Mining Camp.

When J. W. Westfall was in Ferguson Monday an Eagle reporter located him and in the conversation that ensued considerable information was gained about a number of promising claims in the district and also about the methods adopted by the local mining organizations with which he is connected. The name of his company is the Cariboo Creek Development Syndicate and their principal property is the Mohecan group situated at the head of Gainer creek, six miles from Ten-Mile.

The syndicate was formed last season and the above claim was acquired and a force of men put to work early in October. Work was continued up till Xmas when the supply of candles ran short and as a supply could not well be got in over the snow work was discontinued till spring. The old tunnel on the property was cleaned out and retimbered and the tunnel was extended 60 feet further with very encouraging results: The soft caving formation, found in the first part of the tunnel was left behind and the face is now in good solid formation and has been in for 30 or more feet. The ore body widened out to three feet of fine carbonate ore, and the management are disappointed that the men had to quit for they expected by indications that the carbonates would soon have been replaced by solid high grade ore. It was estimated that about 40 feet more would have brought the face directly beneath the surface showing. Next season the property will be worked extensively. The ore carries good gold values, but the last sample has been assayed in Rossland and the result has not been received to date at the Trout Lake office.

The last is an artistic picture of a dog so well executed as to be scarcely distinguishable from a delicate water color.

### The Venezuelan Crisis.

The Venezuelan troubles remain about where they were last week. President Castro does not propose to resign the presidency. He said to a correspondent of the associated press: "You are at liberty to say that I have fought during two years to retain the supreme power which was invested in me by the people of Venezuela. I will no more abdicate than will I resign. The Matos resolution without the assistance of the powers will soon be past history."

A very close blockade is being maintained by the allied powers. It is regrettable that the country is beset with domestic troubles at a time when prompt action is required in respect to her foreign complications.

### Agriculture in B. C.

The census department at Ottawa has issued bulletin No. 12, which relates to agriculture in B. C. The bulletin states that the land in farms comprises 31.59 per cent. in all improved; and 68.41 in an unimproved state. The unimproved lands consist of 391,066 acres in forest and 732,649 in various conditions. The total value of farm property is \$32,465,512. The total value of farm products is \$3,479,683 for crops, and \$2,740,079 for animal products, making 19.16 per cent on the investment on the average farm, or a little higher than is shown in the states of Washington and Idaho. The rate of wages is 24 times higher than in Prince Edward island.

### General.

4800 persons were killed in an earthquake at Andijan, Russian Turkestan, on Dec. 27th.

The annual installation of officers for the Odd Fellow's lodge at Trout Lake, took place on Wednesday.

The King of Saxony is said to be dying and the eloping princess Louise may become Queen at any hour.

The roads are in the best of condition since the thaw and they are being used extensively.

The saw mill has been kept busy filling orders up to the end of this week. On Monday the men will be started cutting logs for next summer's cutting.

The Imperial Bank has issued a neat Xmas card showing a statement of the assets and liabilities of the bank. This has been presented to the Bank's patrons.

A very successful concert was given at Trout Lake last night in aid of the building fund of the English church. A number went down from Ferguson and report an enjoyable time.

The Ferguson quadrille club will give a fancy dress masquerade ball on Feb. 14th. President Glenn is getting two handsome prizes to be given to the handsomest and most comic costume.

The two little children of D. L. Clink deserve special mention for their reciting at last night's concert at the Lake and Mrs. Eisen's singing sustained the splendid reputation that preceded her from Rossland.

The inventor of the "Carrie Nation" cocktail is threatened with a \$10,000 damage suit by Mrs. Nation for using her name. Those who have tasted it are of the opinion that they also have good reason for damage suits.

There is a row in the Dominion Methodist church, Ottawa, over the Minister, Rev. Dr. Rose wearing a gown in the pulpit. Dr. Rose when interviewed on the subject said he intended to continue wearing it.

## COMPLETION OF THE TRAMWAY

To The Silver Cup Mine Occurred Yesterday.

## IT RUNS VERY SMOOTHLY

Most of the Buckets Were Hung Thursday and a Trial Given. Everything proved Highly Satisfactory.

The unusually deep snow of last fall and early winter has proven a serious draw back to the Riblet Tramway Co. in building the tram from Eight-Mile to the Silver Cup mine but this did not prevent Mr. McLeod, the Superintendent, from completing the job and at the same time making a splendid success of the tram. The Cup people can now dispense with the rawhidlers and have their supplies and ore taken up and down a great deal more quickly, less expensively and with a great deal lessened risk of damage and loss. Besides this it will enable the company to get the heavy compressor machinery to the mine at once and get it installed before spring. So it was of great consequence that the tram be completed in good order and there is hardly a man in this camp who will not feel pleased. The Cup will install its compressor and the development will be carried on rapidly. We expect to see large quantities of ore coming from the Cup when the little odds and ends about the tram are completed and the machinery started in earnest.

### The Late Archbishop of Canterbury.

A perculiarity of the late Archbishop of Canterbury, which I have not seen referred to in any of his obituaries, was the extraordinary harshness and rasping character of his voice, a peculiarity of which he was well aware and concerning which he was wont to tell all sorts of amusing stories, among others one to the effect that on a Sunday evening, having slipped into a back pew of a popular church in the east end of London, and joined in the singing of a Moody and Sankey hymn from a hymn book which had been extended to him friendly fashion by a laboring man, the latter at the end of the first verse, drew away the hymn book from him, gave him a dig in the ribs with his elbow and remarked in a low whisper: "Here, dry up, mister, you're spollin' the show."

Nor have I seen it mentioned that the late archbishop was descended in a direct line from Lady Godiva, so famous in connection with her decollete ride through the streets of Coventry. The old archbishop was proud of this ancestry as well as of the fact that he was entitled to bear the same coat of arms as her husband, Leofric, Earl of Mercia.—Marquise de Fontenoy.

### Ore Going Out.

The steamboat Victoria is hauling out the Silver Cup ore to the railway. When the Cup ore sheds are emptied the Nettie L. ore will be shipped. The ore from these two mines keeps the Victoria pretty busy.

The business transacted at the Trout Lake express office for December was larger than in any preceding three months since the office was opened.

### Australian Politics.

"The great Democratic experiment under the Southern Cross has been tried; the first session of the first Australian National parliament entrusted with the most advanced Constitution in the world, and Australians are eagerly scanning the fruit of seven-month's continuous and unparalleled legislative activity."

So writes a Melbourne correspondent on Oct. 22, in commenting upon the work of the first session of the first parliament elected under the new constitution of the Australian Commonwealth. The record of that extraordinary prorogued session is interesting both for the amount of work done—no less than 32 Acts of Parliament were passed, including a tariff which was practically a fusion of six previously existing and conflicting tariffs—and from the character of that work. From our correspondent's record it may be thus summarised:

### Adult Suffrage.

Every adult woman and every adult man is made a voter in all national elections throughout the entire Commonwealth.

### "Property" Vetoed.

All property qualifications for voters are swept away.

### Wheat Colored.

No man may spend over his election more than £250 if competing for the Senate, or £100 if standing for the House of representatives.

### Aliens Excluded.

The door is shut upon Chinese, Japanese, colored laborer, and any other alien immigration calculated to lower the standard of living and wages in the Commonwealth.

### A White Australia.

The Kanakas are being gradually banished from Queensland.

### State Telegraphs and Telephones.

Postal and telegraph and telephone rates within the Commonwealth have been cheapened to an extent never before possible.

### Anti-Militarism.

A deadly blow has been struck at the professional military spirit by the affirmation of the principle that there shall be a purely citizen army for Australia, and no compulsory service outside the Commonwealth.

### Self-Government.

The right of Governors or Governors-General to oppose or defend or publicly comment on Ministerial acts has been dramatically and emphatically repudiated.

### From Messenger to Under-Secretary.

A Federal public service in which the very highest posts shall be open to the poorest with ability has been legislated for.

### State Minimum Wage.

A minimum wage of £10 a year for every adult Government employe, with three years service, woman or man, has been provided.

### Black Labor Barred.

A date has been fixed after which Australian mails cannot be carried on steamers employing black labor.

"And," adds the correspondent, "the list is capable of great expansion. The 220 sittings of the House of Representatives during the first Federal session have irrevocably stamped Australian political development with the hall mark of extreme radicalism and quasi-Socialism."

Hon. T. H. Maguire, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the North West Territories, has resigned and it is understood that Hon. Arthur Sifton has been appointed to succeed him as Chief Justice of the N. W. T. Mr. Sifton is Commissioner of Public Works in the Hawaiian Government.

On Lardeau creek above Ferguson.

## MUCH WORK BEING PLANNED

For Coming Season. Many Deals Were Quietly Perfected Last Fall. 1903 Will be Busy in Lardeau.

There is every indication that the mining season of 1903, which will open in the Lardeau about June, will be productive of more development in this section of B. C. than any previous year and there seems to be a growing feeling of confidence, evinced by outsiders particularly, that the Lardeau is one of the safest and surest fields for investment in B. C.

We have information that the Lardeau-Duncan Development Co. will develop the Primrose and Golden Circle properties on an extensive scale and the writer took occasion to ask Mr. Westfall for his opinion of the property for he knew it better than anyone else under the former ownership. He stated that the Primrose is a very fine property, first its splendid position in a highly mineralized zone; second its fine ledges and lastly on account of its ore carrying rich gold values together with the presence of silver in large quantities.

"I have no doubt," said Mr. Westfall, "of the high gold values for I made a very careful examination and selected samples across and for the full extent of the lead as far as opened up, a little over a year ago and I found the average to assay high in gold."

He has not seen the property since that time, however, but he is confident of its good formation and will undoubtedly make a mine. The sister property, Golden Circle, joins the Primrose, but it is not developed though there are a number of very nice leads to be seen on the surface. Mr. Westfall thinks this should make a mine too.

### Hope For Silver.

The London, Eng., Statist has firm belief that silver will advance in price very soon. It says:

"We base the opinion on several considerations. One of these is that so soon as the new year sets in, the stringency in the American money market will come to an end. A second and more powerful cause is the recuperative power that is being shown by India. China is regaining its usual condition, and business is going on fairly satisfactorily. That being so, it is probable that China will be in a position to take more silver than she has done of late, and if China and India buy more freely there must necessarily be a recovery in the silver market."

## EDITORIAL NOTES.

Exceptionally good opportunities exist right here in Ferguson to make money and plenty of it. The plan is a proven one and it would not require much capital either. The idea is for someone with enterprise to organize a local development syndicate to take hold of desirable mining properties that are being held by prospectors who have not the means to open them up. There are many such properties close to Ferguson, and they are lying practically idle simply for the reason that their owners are unable to get the required capital to open them up. If ten or twelve of the business men and residents would form themselves into a syndicate it would cost them very little individually to open up two or three properties during a season and the chances are very favorable for making a nice bit of money. Then look at the good it would do the town in many ways. The most good, we believe, would be from the advertising it would give the camp. It would prove to the people on the outside what we all undoubtedly feel, that we have the best of confidence in the mineral resources of our camp. It need not apply simply to local enterprise for there are opportunities for several such organizations. Such a syndicate need not go into mining but just developing prospects and we believe there is more sure money in developing properties and then selling than in actual mining. At the same time there is always a demand for well developed prospects and the English and American capitalists will pay all for such a property that it is seen to be worth. In most other B. C. and American mining towns there are just such syndicates and they do well for themselves and for the district by opening it up, building up a town and advertising and keeping things moving.

There is an exciting race on in Vancouver to capture the seat made vacant by the death of Geo. Maxwell, M. P., for Burrard. The seat has been filled by a liberal since 1896 and there looked to be a good

chance for the liberals to carry the bye election but Joseph Martin is in Vancouver yet and he appears to be dissatisfied with the choice of the liberals in McPherson as a candidate and as Mr. Martin has always followed there is a split in the party and a probability that a Mart-nite liberal will be nominated.

Then ex-Lieutenant Governor McInnes is going to run as an independent and the conservatives will run a candidate and Chris. Foley has announced his intention of running as a labor candidate. So there are aspirants galore for the Burrard seat.

The public school opened Monday. There was but a small attendance. Ferguson has a good school and we're having fine weather and the school room is comfortable. We trust parents will try and keep the children at school for the good of the children and to keep up the average. Good results cannot be attained unless pupils attend regularly.

Counterfeits are sometimes perforated on three of the edges, and sometimes only on two. Keep a sharp lookout for the counterfeiters. 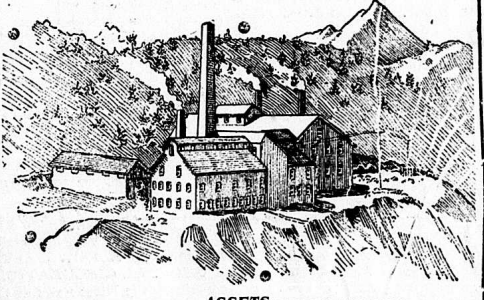
