Former Le Roi Manager Thinks Canadian Government Should Form a Prospecting Party.

Bernard MacDonald, former man-ager of the Le Roi mine at Rossland, believes he has hit on a scheme by which the whole of the Canadian Rocky mountains may be thoroughly exploited. He asserts that the Rocky mountains beyond the Canadian border are consistently the same geological range that has yielded such fabulous profits in the United States.

"Within Canadian territory the Rockies have an approximate length of 1,600 miles by an average breadth of from 500 to 700 miles, and possess the same general structural features as they do in the southerly extension into American and Mexican territory. For this reason it is fair to assume that the Canadian-Rockies will yield a quantity of precising metals equal to that produced by them in American or Magican territory—mile for mile of their-longth when equally developed."

In order to bring out these regources, which he believes need only syploration, Mr. MacDonald suggests, first of all the formation of a corposation to carry on a five years' prospecting campaign with a working force 'pf', say 60 men. "Within Canadian territory the

paign with a weram, or men. "Stock a force," he says, "should be under the general supervision and direction of a field manager, why should be geologist in chief of the pasky. The working party should be divticed into posts of six men each, who should be encamped in the muntains, say from six to ten miles distant from each other, moving camp from time to time, as the possibilities of discovering paying mineral in one location became exhausted. Each post should consist of three prosectors, one assayer, one cook, and one geologist or practical miner. When discoveries of pay mineral are made by any poet, all the land on which such iscoveries are made should be located in the benefit of the corporation. "Operating in this way, the advance

"Operating in this way, the advance of the party would cover a line of 90 miles in length, and large areas of the Rocky mountains would be prospected during the life of the campaign." It is scarcely possible that a campaign of this kinh would fail to discover one or more igness of paying mineral."

However, private capital is not likely to enjage in this work, says Mr. MacDonstil, and he has come to the opinion that systematic exploration by the Government along such lines is necessary.

THE MINES OF LARDEAU

And Working Properties That With Development Should Become Shipping Mines.

The above claims are owned by Robert Burns of Ferguson, and are situ-ated in the famous free gold belt that extends from the Gyster-Criterion on Fish creek, southward through the Lardeau. CONCERNING POPLAR CREEK.

Glowing reports of the recent rich strikes of free gold bearing quartz on Poplar creek in the Lardeau, have been published and circulated profusely by the newspapers of Canada and likewise across the boundary line. These reports have been corroborated over and over again by reliable men who have visited the scene of the reported discoveries, so it is quite certain that gold has been found in large and lasting quantity. Many mining men in Ferguson have known for years that ledges existed on the tributary creeks of the lower Lardeau river that contained gold in paying quantity, but until this spring comparatively little work had been done and no rock of fabulous richness had been reported. However, early this spring gold bearing quartz was brought into Ferguson by A. J. Gordon, Jack Nesbitt and G. Monroe which had beads of the yellow metal sticking out all over it. This was from Rapid creek and was the result of development work carried on this spring. A few weeks later the rich stuff was found six miles farther down the Lardeau on Poplar creek, and the reports that have reached us affirm that the gold is well disseminated throughout the lead matter.

The reports sent out may have been enlarged upon, but from what we can learn we believe this is not the case.

So far only one knocker has been heard from, and the warning note has been sounded, as reported in the Vancouver Province of the and instant, by a Mr. George Macdonald of Vancouver. If Mr. Macdonald was correctly reported by the Province he certainly showed that he was very ignorant of the Lardeau and its mining properties when he said:

"Of course some of the big mines like the Silver Cup and others having their own stamp mills, are doing exceedingly well." Mr. Macdonald's inquiries, though, were confined to the alleged placer and recent almost all-gold discoveries. Concerning these he is very skeptical.

The Silver Cup ore carries good value in gold but we were not aware of it being a stamp mill proposition.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The Lardeau district is certainly a place of great activity at the present time. From the town of Lardo on Kootenay lake, around to Beaton en Arrow lake, people are flocking in by the hundreds. Travellers who have been all over the Kootenays, say that this naturally favored district has more life, and things generally are better than in any other part of the B. C. interior.

This is due to the richness and staying qualities of our mineral deposits and also to the perseverance and confidence of some of our mine managers in pushing development along before we have transportation facilities that will justify large shipments being made. Ferguson is particularly active as tar as work and numbers of men are concerned, and people are coming every day. The mines are increasing their working forces and new properties are being opened up and things look very hopeful.

Road Superintendent Hugh Mc-Pherson is having the roads and bridges in the Lardeau repaired and put into condition for traffic. The road to Ten Mile has two gangs at work, and before they finish, the bridge across the North fork of the Lardeau will be replanked. The road from Beaton to Camborne is being corduroyed in places.

County Court has been postponed once more, this time from the 9th to the 16th day of July. This is getting monotonously and people having important cases to be disposed of are beginning to think the court a farce. They would like a definite date in the future.

The three claims owned by the company are the "Lardeau Queem," the "Lardeau King" and the "Lardeau Prince," all abutting end to end, through which three leads pass the entire length, situated at the head of Lexington creek, in the Lardeau mining division of Week Kootenay, British Columbia.

The property has an excellent surface showing. The average assay are most encouraging, considering the great width and continuancy of the leads across the country with such great width and prominence of the surface judging from other properties in the near vicinity, some of which are on the same lead and have developed very rich ore bodies.

In conclusion I would say that the Lardeau Mines are as good as any, if not the best, in the vicinity, and I verily believe with a nominal expenditure, they should be made dividend paying in a short time, and I would strongly recommend extensive development toward that end.
