NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

A complete report of the meeting of the National Executive Committee, held at Chicago, March 29-31, appears in the National Party Bulletin for April, which is being sent out to the party members. The report shows that much business was transacted, and we give a summary of the most important matters and refer all interested to the bulletin for the full report.

All the committee members, Work, Flotten, Simons, Mally, Kerr, Band, Hoar and Tower, were present at each session.

One of the first things acted upon was the appointment of a sub-committee to draft a plan of action for the party in connection with the report of the Western Federation of Miners' officials. The sub-committee reported as follows and the report was adopted by the whole committee:

To Assist Imprisoned Miners.

The committee would recommend that the first of May celebration wherever practicable be also made a protest meeting, and that the cooperation of all labor organizations be invited and that parades with transparencies be utilized as a means of publicity.

Recommend that the National Committee issue a uniform poster for use of such meetings containing portraits of Comrades Wood and Haywood and a brief statement of the facts in the case, leaving space for date and place of meeting.

Recommend that the Socialist press the necessity of taking up this matter actively and publishing not only full statements of the case, but also editorially urging action by the members.

Recommend that the National Committee prepare a list of available papers for publication in the Socialist press for the use of pressing local problems, and that the committee also submit the following resolutions, which were adopted:

"Whereas, The success of the conspiracy against the leaders of the Western Federation of Miners depends upon the acquiescence or silence of the working class in the United States, and is possible only through the powers of government are still in the hands of the capitalist class; therefore be it

Resolved, That we consider the most effective means of defending our comrades and preventing the repetition of such outrages, lie in the organization of the organized labor movement and the threat and possibility which such a movement carries in the capture of the form of government by the workers.

A new quarterly statement form for local use was approved and the National Secretary instructed to furnish same to local contacts.

The party emblem will be gotten out in a form suitable for women to wear. It was decided that in view of pressing local problems, no other movement be organized to raise money for Finland and Russia, but that this be left to the various localities to act upon as they see fit.

The National Secretary was instructed to take Special pains to see that tickets are nominated in all the unorganized states and territories. The sum of \$1000 dollars was pledged for the Colorado strike to fight for the right of free speech in the streets of Denver.

The action of the National Secretary in refusing to encourage non-members of the Socialist party of Omaha and in supporting the regular party organization was approved.

A protest against Arthur Morrow Lewis by Local Globes was held in abeyance until answer is received from Comrade Lewis, when the same shall be submitted to the National Executive Committee.

Foreign-speaking lecturers and organizers will be permitted to secure their own applications for dates, when desired, the dates to be assigned and the tours otherwise handled by the National office, as for other speakers.

It was voted, upon request, that special attention be given to Montana and other Rocky Mountain states. The National Secretary was instructed to place himself in communication with Comrade August Bebel, of Germany, with a view to securing his services for a tour of this country at his convenience.

A telegram of sympathy with the miners strike was sent to the United Mine Workers convention at Indianapolis.

The National Secretary was instructed to secure lists of addresses to furnish Socialist papers for the distribution of literature on the Moyer-Haywood case.

The sub-committee on literature reported as follows and the report was adopted:

Report of Committee on Literature.

Your sub-committee on literature, has considered the question of distribution of literature by the National Office and desires to emphasize the importance of this department from both an educational and political standpoint. The necessity of the widest distribution of sound Socialist literature is so self-evident that no further argument on that phase of the subject is needed from us. It is the financial success of the party which is the main need for our recognition.

We find that the National Office can, by suitable arrangements with the various publishers, handle and sell Socialist books and pamphlets at a cost small in proportion to the returns. Through the mail-order method an average profit of at least 25 per cent can be realized, and with extensive business it can readily meet all other additional financial needs.

At present, the only regular source of revenue of the National Office is that of dues, and it is necessary that an additional source be secured. This can be accomplished by the literature department, but it will depend upon the party members and locals how profitable the department can be made.

To increase the usefulness of the department, we recommend that the National Secretary prepare a descriptive catalogue of all books and pamphlets now in stock, and that a presentation of the purposes and usefulness of the department as a party means of organized advertising.

We recommend that wherever possible uniform plates for permanent use be ordered of organized advertising agencies, and show bills and such other literature in constant use by the National Office be supplied at the expense.

committee was concurred in. The May Day committee reported progress. Tickets are ordered and comrades are urged to push the sale. Only a short time remains in which to place all the tickets and everybody should make haste. It was decided to ask (Comrade) Hamilton to give the address. May it be possible to get him at that time, but to take him in any case and have him act as principal speaker for the protest meeting.

Comrade Kahn presented the following amendments to the constitution, providing for the submission of nominees for second and third ballots in referendum by a majority endorsed by the C. C. and ordered to take the regular course. "Section 1. A majority of all votes legally cast shall be necessary to elect to any office or position in the Socialist party of Ohio or of any of its subdivisions. Whenever an election does not result in a majority choice on the first ballot, only the two names having received the two highest numbers of votes shall again be voted on if only one candidate is to be elected; if several are to be elected, those whose names are on a majority of the ballots shall be elected. The election on the second ballot received the next highest number of votes, only twice as many shall be submitted for a second ballot as there are places to be filled. If, however, the strict application of this rule would require a different treatment of several candidates who have received the same number of votes, the names of all the candidates shall again be admitted. If the second ballot is necessary in order that all places may be filled by candidates elected by a majority of the votes, the same shall be done before, and so on. Whenever a name appears more than once on the same ballot, it shall be counted as if appearing only once.

"Section 2. A committee may be appointed, instead of being elected, only if it is to perform merely minor services that do not extend beyond the duration of the session. No official appointment is made and if no objection is raised by any comrade entitled to a vote at that session."

Editorial Note

The New Jersey Unity Conference

The Sixth and probably last session of the conference between the Socialist Party and Socialist Labor Party of New Jersey was held March 4. The subject was the election of the executive committee to devise ways and means for publishing the proceedings of the conference in a pamphlet form as follows:

Your committee has held two meetings since the last session of the conference, one February 25, the other March 3. As the result of our labors a committee has been organized to present for your consideration, the manifesto which has been drawn up, and also makes the following announcement:

Our Ways and Means: That the conference itself raise a fund for the publication, in pamphlet form, of its proceedings. The committee has prepared 60 subscription lists, so that if the plan is adopted, work can start at once. An estimate is that from \$150 to \$175 will be needed. We figure that there should be made for an average of \$2 each, and that the sales from the pamphlet will make up any event.

We recommend the election of a committee to carry out the publication of the proceedings, through the labor of a Financial Secretary and a Treasurer to handle the finances. We also recommend that the conference do not adjourn sine die until the work of publication has been completed and the matter referred to the next conference.

It is also recommended that meetings to discuss the findings of the conference be arranged between the Socialist Party locals and the Socialist Labor Party sections in the various counties.

Our limited space makes it impossible to go into the details of the conference in full but it is nothing more than a summing up of the main points of the conference. A brief summary will give an accurate idea of what it is.

The conference has also decided to declare that it found the question of unity between the Socialist Party and the Socialist Labor Party to be a matter of the greatest importance, the proper attitude for the Socialist Party to assume on the subject of the conference is as follows:

The Socialist, in clubs of ten, three months for 15 cents, during April. Canvass your neighbors and get a club. It's easy.

As to the first conference held at Toledo, the party is a class-conscious and properly conducted industrial organization "ready to hold and hold fast to the constructive powers of the land," and so able to enforce the law of the Socialist party will be but a flash in the pan and successful, at best, in a hedging, political, and scheming "intellectuals."

The conference held that for the party to favor the tactics of the "reformers" is to stultify the Socialist principles and aims, and to make the party a mere "reform" party, a party of "reform" and not a party of "revolution."

On the second question the conference held that it has a two-fold meaning to Socialists. First, the holding of the party is to be the rule and regulations that the acts prescribed for the realization of the party's aim. Second, the party of the party to censure or expel as unprincipled, unfraternal or unfaithful to the party's aim.
