He has framed a new law concerning the promotion, emoluments, pensions and discipline of government employes. The disciplinary part of this law places them, in principle at least, on the same footing with regard to striking as solders and saltons occupy; that its to say, it practically denies them the right to strike.

The law has two principal sanctions. "In the case of a collective or concerted cessation of work all disciplinary penalties may be inflicted with-arisous formalistic designed for the protection of employees."

Briand, in the pressible, states that this provision is meant to "enable to government when the public interest is threatened by a coalition of private interests, to adopt, without a moment's delay, the measures required by the situation and to proceed at once to replace the trunts with a view to re-establishing the service."

TO ALL PARTIES FORMED BY THE PROPERTIED CLASSES, HEREBY DECLARE THAT I HAVE SEVERED MY RELATIONS WITH ALL
OTHER PARTIES, THAT I ENDORSE THE PLATFORM AND CONSTITUTION OF THE SOCIALIST PARTY, INCLUDING THE PRINCIPLE OF POLITICAL ACTION, AND HEREBY APPLY FOR ADMISSION TO SAID
PARTY."
